In the past I have taught a separate class on how to search different sites. THERE IS A LOT MORE THAN JUST ANCESTRY AND FAMILY SEARCH! If that is all you are using, you are missing some fantastic sites. I don't have time in this class to teach the proper ways to search on ancestry.com but just putting in a name is not always the best way. Below are some sample sites you may not know about. I tried to include something for the various areas you told me about in the survey for this class. There are many more! Be creative and look around! This list is intended to give you some places to start, and I am positive there are new sites listed here even for those of you who have done a lot of research.

** indicate ones that may be really helpful. If you have NY folks DO NOT MISS FULTON HISTORY....it is newspapers from around the state...not just Fulton. If you need help searching this, email me for some tips. Carol


I. Entering a search in Google.com.....You can use the basic google search TIPS: Use "....." around terms if you want them both together as "Adam Vrooman" put the most important term first as: Schenectady Massacre and not just Massacre Use * between words if you want them to appear close to each other but not necessarily adjacent as Mary * Jones (this would allow for a middle initial) Use **for two or more missing characters as Mei**n would allow for Meighan, Meighen, Meigan

Use **? for only one missing character** as Johns?n would search for Johnson and Johnsen but NOT Johnston

II. If you want to search only IMAGES, click on the word IMAGES at the top right. Enter the search term and then click the Google Search bar. Great for finding photos, maps etc



III.You can also do a regular Google search and THEN click on Maps, Images, etc. from the results.



IV. There is more than one Google search engine! There are numerous international Google sites and they WILL RETURN DIFFERENT RESULTS!
